This is a fast paced class with one assignment due each week. You will be graded on execution, effort applied, and production of work. If you are not grasping any ideas or concepts about the camera, or you would like to learn more about any given topic, feel free to reach out to me during or after class, by phone or email.

Course Description:

An introduction to professional practices in commercial and advertising photography. Students will learn how to understand and navigate the commercial market and create commercial photography clients such as; magazines, advertisements, architecture, and photographic illustrations.

This class is all about problem solving, time management and improving your craft.

Time management is very important for this class. You have one assignment due every week plus in class assignments, a midterm and your final project. It's important that you stay on top of your work. Missing one or two of your assignments is enough to lower your grade.

Purpose:

This class will explore the areas in the world of professional photography, proficiency in the capture of images with both natural and artificial light sources. We will work on developing a better sense of design and composition with assignments being more *conceptual than defined*. In other words it is not about the obvious but more about the implied. This class is all about you the photographer telling your viewer a visual story with the use of creativity, uniqueness with the rich emotions your images give the viewer.

Assignments:

All digital files are due the night before class ay 7pm (Monday) and prints are due at the start of day of class

All assignments are to have capture dates after the first day of class except assignments that state otherwise. Any earlier work turned it will be given zero points for that assignment.

All meta data for the images needs to be included with each image.

Any Assignment that is out of focus will receive -1 points.

All the assignments with articles and videos are on my website at www.genesasse.com with a link in the menu bar.

All digital assignment files are due the night before (Monday) class by 7 pm any assignments submitted after this time is considered late. Bring your camera to class:

From time to time I may assign an in class assignment that is due the same day

Notes:

This is an advanced photography class. You should look at me as if I'm your client, but instead of being paid you're rewarded with a grade. If you're late with an assignment you missed the deadline. As a client you need to make sure you turn in the best possible image the 1st time. When you're in business you need repeat clients and the way to keep clients is to the best work you can, with no excuses. All Assignments are available online so you can work on multiple assignments at one time. All assignment need to unique to you.

All assignments are to be shot RAW then processed as necessary. You will be asked from time to time to summit your RAW files. Besides shooting with RAW format I also recommend that you to set your camera to Adobe RGB and average white balance.

Label your images with the assignment being the 1st item-last name_1st name- file number. The file name will look like this.

1-1st name_last name7321.tif

If this information is missing or not in this format there will no redo's and you will receive a zero for the assignment.

I reserve the right as your instructor to modify the course content (assignments, grading procedures, tests etc.) as the situation dictates. I will inform the students of any such changes via class announcements or email. If you miss a class check with fellow students to find out what you missed.

RCC Drop policy:

It is your responsibility to drop this class by the appropriate drop deadline set forth by Riverside City College if you do not plan to continue attending this course. Additionally, if you miss class three times without an excused absence, if you fall behind by three assignments, or if you continually disrupt this class, the professor has the option to drop you from this class. As part of grading I do critiques of your work in class. The critiques are not about what's wrong with the images but how to make the images better. Photography is about telling stories visually.

The better the images the better the story.

On all assignments it is your job as a photographer is to turn in the best images possible. That means if you have any distracting elements in your image, you should crop them out or retouch them. This is one of the final classes in this program so all images should be technically perfect. Proper focus, perfect exposure and color balance. No distracting elements to pull your eye away from the subject. No blown out highlights or blocked shadows.

Your job as a photographer is to seduce, amuse and entertain

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Assignment 1: Best Image

Due: Aug 28th 2023

Format: Digital | 1 color & 1 B&W

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Assignment 2: Coke

Due: Sep 4th Format: Digital

This assignment is to photograph a red can of coke.

Coke Red is Pantone / PMS 484 / #9c301a Hex Color Code, RGB. The hexadecimal color code #9c301a is a medium dark shade of red.

Photograph a can of coke in any setting and try and match the color as close as you can. Make sure the edges of the can are parallel to each other and the top of the can looks like shinny metal. Keep in mind there is a possibility of color contamination from the color of the area surrounding the subject.



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Assignment 3: Illustrated Quote

Due: Sep 11th 2023 Format: Digital | Color

This assignment is to illustrate the quote for a double truck magazine spread.

The size of the spread 11"h x 17"w @ 300ppi. The image should be strong and bold to stop the person so they read the quote. Place the quote somewhere in the image so it complements the image but doesn't detract from it.

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Assignment 4 Money

Due: Sep 2023

Format: Print | Color or B&W

You have been hired to create an illustrative image for an article discussing the relationship between money and homelessness.





Here are the steps and requirements for completing the assignment:

- 1. Topic: The topic of the assignment is to address the issue of homelessness in relation to money.
- 2. Bill Selection: Photograph a relatively new currency bill as the base for the illustration. It should be recognizable and commonly used.
- 3. Software: Utilize Adobe Photoshop to manipulate images effectively.
- 4. Image Modification: Open the chosen bill image in Photoshop and carefully remove the center portion of the bill using appropriate editing tools, such as the lasso tool or the selection tool. Ensure that the removal process is precise, so the final image looks clean and professional.
- 5. Homelessness Image: Create a powerful and meaningful image that clearly illustrates the issue of homelessness. It could be a photograph depicting a homeless individual or a scene that represents the challenges faced by homeless people.
- 6. Placement: Place the chosen homelessness image precisely within the center section of the bill. Adjust its size and position to fit within the bill's dimensions accurately.
- 7. Color or B&W: The inside image illustrating homelessness can be either B&W or in color. However, the bill itself should remain in color to maintain recognition.
- 8. Lines and Alignment: Ensure that the lines of the bill are straight, square, and parallel to maintain a realistic appearance. Pay attention to the overall alignment of the elements within the image.
- 9. Print Format: The final image should have a width of 14 inches and will be printed on a 9x17-inch paper. This will leave a margin around the bill for presentation.
- 10. Your Name: Add your name in the lower right corner of the image using a 14pt easy-to-read font. This attribution is essential to give credit to the artist responsible for the artwork.

The goal of this assignment is to provide your editor with a thought-provoking and visually impactful image that complements the article's content on money and homelessness. The combination of the currency bill and the homelessness image should help convey the message effectively to the readers.

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Assignment 5: Product Cereal

Due: Monday Sep 25th

Format: Digital Color | Vertical 20x24in

This assignment is to produce a photo for a new product launch.

The subject is a new unopened box of cereal on a plain white background (white sheet will work nicely). Photograph cereal with a ¾ view making sure the box is square and all edges are parallel, the side away from the camera should be darker than the front side. Remove and replaced the background with a vertical graduated background from black to white.



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Assignment 5 Flip Composite

Due: Sep 27th 2022

Format: Digital & Print | Color



After processing the image, make a copy and flip the image horizontally and then put them together in the center creating a mirror image. Select those two images and then flip them vertically

This is a color assignment, square format. The image will be 22"x22" on 24"x24" paper.

Due: Oct 9th 2023 **Format:** Color

Image Size: 32in long dimension

You will be graded on your creativity, uniqueness and the emotion your image evokes.

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Assignment 9: Loneliness

Due: Oct 23rd 2023 **Format:** Digital Color

Image Size: Best crop at 300ppi

A mental health group needs a color image illustrating isolation and loneliness. They would like the subject looking through a window using a low key application to illustrate the concept. A low key image uses mid-tones to darker-tones or black.

There are various technical challenges depending on the subject, what the photographer wants to highlight in the frame. Photographing a single person and, for instance, if the photographer wants to highlight only half of the subject's face, a single light source placed laterally, at a certain distance and angle to the subject, and possibly a blend, will be usually used Experimenting with different light intensities is performed until the desired effect is achieved. Special attention is paid to having sufficient neutral details that will, invariably, be left in the shade.

Pay close attention to the environment making sure no elements distract from the subject and make sure to color correct.

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Assignment 10: Building Extraction

Due: Oct 31st 2023
Format: Print | B&W

A new design office has opened catering to architects. They need 4 B&W images showing bold geometric shapes of building details. The images need to full toned images with no blown out highlights or blocked up shadows

This assignment is to find and photograph 4 building details. This assignment can be in black & white. After you select the 4 images that you feel work best together and crop them to 10x10 inches. Assemble the 4 images that you have selected arranged with a 1.5 inch boarder on all 4 sides and 1 inch space between the images. Printed on 24x24in paper



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Assignment: 11 Blue Hour

Due: Nov 6th 2023

"I have always been fascinated by the poetic condition of twilight.

By its transformative quality. Its power of turning the ordinary into something magical and otherworldly.

My wish is for the narrative in the pictures to work within that circumstance.

It is that sense of in-between-ness that interests me." —Gregory Crewdson

Find and photograph an urban scene at dusk or twilight. The image can be a single building, cityscape or an urban setting. The buildings need artificial lighting or other structures with artificial lighting. The sky needs be blue not black with the inclusion of other light sources. I'm not looking for sunset images but a sunset can be included and no **Silhouettes!** For best results do not photograph buildings facing east. If you choose to photograph buildings facing east it will need to be shot before sunrise or dawn.

Be aware of lighting and how it enhances, or takes away from the quality of what you are trying to say with your photography. **Time of day is very important to dusk, twilight or dawn images.**

Look at your subjects. If there is something in your viewfinder that doesn't support or enhance what you are trying to accomplish, don't include it or remove it with photoshop! Make sure you correct your color balance if needed in photoshop or lightroom. If you need a tripod for this assignment see Nancy C. to check out a tripod.







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Assignment 12: The Grand Landscape

Due: Nov 15th

Format: Print | Color

A client wants a large panorama image for their lobby. They are looking for a dramatic image that gets visitors attention when they walk into the lobby.

This assignment is to create a wide landscape with 6 vertical images or more stitched together. This can be either an urban landscape or a natural landscape. The image size is 10x41 inches on 13x44inch paper.







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Assignment: Final Project | Quote Book

Due: Dec 4th

Images to turn in: 1 Booklet

Your final project is to create a 42 page booklet plus cover with 20 images and 20 quotes. Pick a theme of your choice and use the quotes to tie the images together. The booklet is 8.5x11in horizontal format. The booklet can be built in Photoshop, Indesign or the program of your choice as long as you can produce the final booklet and a PDF file saved as spreads not pages.

Front cover 8.5x11in horizontal format with acetate cover. The cover to include: title name and one or two images from inside the booklet no bleeds.






